**Statement:**

The International Astronomical Union (IAU) is the global organization for astronomers. I attended my first IAU meeting in Manchester as a PhD student, and became a member in Prague in 2006 shortly after moving to a post-doc in the US, at around the same time as I joined the AAS. As our global body, the IAU plays a vital role in representing the interests of the global astronomical community, and as such has an important role alongside national organizations like the AAS in promoting dark and radio-quiet skies and other similar activities. It also supports the Office of Astronomy for Development, leveraging the universal human interest in the night sky to support global development goals.

I would bring to the US National Committee for the IAU (USNC-IAU) my experience as an international astronomer and of working in the very different environments of Puerto Rico and California. I am also a frequent attender of AAS meetings, and may have met many of you while staffing the booths for Arecibo Observatory and now for SOFIA. You might recognize my

If chosen to serve as a member of the USNC-IAU, I would seek to promote the activities of the IAU, and the opportunities for AAS members to get involved, as well as the importance of our global community and international collaborations to astronomy in the US.
